**Description:** Fundamentals of writing for the mass media. Includes instruction in professional methods and techniques for gathering, processing, and delivering content.

The first half of the semester will concentrate on the basics of news and reporting as well as online news writing. The second half will concentrate on broadcast news writing.

**Supplies Needed**: Items used to take notes; folder or notebook where you will save syllabus, schedule, notes, handouts, and graded stories.

**Course Requirements:** Students must attend all class/ lab meetings and complete all assignments.

**Required Textbook**: Associated Press Stylebook and Libel Manual. NY: The Associated Press. We will provide you with a digital access.

**Evaluation**: Students' grades in this class will be determined by the following:

You will have one midterm exam. Your final exam will take the form of a script for a video story.

In addition to stories, assignments, quizzes and midterm exam, your final grade will include 100 points of participation which is determined by the grid below.

**Deadlines**: The assignments in this class will be deadline driven. You must keep track of deadlines and submit work when it is due.

ALL deadlines are absolute. You need to get used to deadlines that exist in the off-campus world. All assignments will be due at the beginning of each class unless told otherwise. Late assignments may be penalized harshly if they are accepted at all.

**Absence Policy**: Students are expected to attend all classes and labs in order to be successful in this course.

Student athletes or those participating in other college-sponsored activities that require an absence, will be excused, with prior notice to me and appropriate documentation.

Please do **NOT** assume that I will contact you to tell you about missed work. A ssume there could be multiple classwork assignments each day of class. You may or may not be allowed to do "makeup" work depending on the length of your absence, the reason for your absence, whether you have supporting documentation to prove why you missed class, and what assignment it was that you missed. Some group assignments cannot be made up.

Do NOT assume that I will move deadlines for you unless you contact me and offer acceptable reasons why you cannot meet them.

In the event that you miss your midterm exam, you must notify me within 48 hours about why. You may or may not be able to "make up" the missed exam. If you miss an exam due to COVID-19, you will take the exam the day you return.

<u>Withdrawal Policy</u>: The last day to withdraw/drop with a grade of "W" this semester is scheduled to be April 24.

It is the student's responsibility to withdraw from this course. Otherwise, students will be assigned their earned letter grade at the end of the course. Course averages will be updated frequently, and guidance will be provided throughout the term to help students decide whether they need to drop the class or not. There will be a no tardy rule for the lab in both sections of this class. Once

we all learn how to get onto Collaborate, you will be expected to join the lab promptly at 1215. It will last a full 30 minutes.

For those in my face-to-face section, I enforce a 5-minute tardiness rule. I use the clock in the classroom or on my computer to check the time. You may come to class **up to** 5 minutes late. That's the cutoff. If you arrive **after** that 5-minute window, you'll be given one warning. The next time you arrive to class past the 5-minute window, you'll be asked to leave. I may or may not have taken attendance already if you arrive 5 minutes late. It's up to you to make sure you are marked present.

## **Academic Integrity**
