Course Description: SPAN 1411 (4:3:3). This course is specifically designed for beginning Spanish students. The course includes a study of basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level. Semester Hours: 4; Lecture Hours: 3; Lab Hours: 3. Pre-requisite: none. Students with two or more years of high school Spanish or significant Spanish-speaking background will be enrolled in SPAN 1412.

Additional Information:

This course is designed to improve your Spanish language skills through interaction, communication, and a deeper understanding of Hispanic culture. It covers all language skills—speaking, listening, reading, and writing—while emphasizing both cultural awareness and linguistic proficiency. Active participation is key, especially for speaking and reading, and will require you to prepare and practice regularly. You will engage in various activities, including sharing personal experiences, which will help reinforce real-world language use.

Your listening comprehension will improve through online exercises, listening activities, and course materials such as audio recordings and comprehension exercises in LingroHub. To maximize your success, I encourage you to immerse yourself in Spanish outside of class by watching Spanish-language media, listening to Spanish radio or podcasts, and reading in Spanish. Additionally, you'll have opportunities to practice speaking through recordings or pre-recorded group activities.

Fluency is important, but understanding grammar fundamentals is also crucial for building proficiency. We will discuss grammar in English to ensure clarity. Language learning takes time, and consistent practice is essential. You will have access to various online resources to support your learning, and high expectations will be set across all areas of the course.

Technology Requirements:

Ensure that you have regular access to your SPC email and a reliable internet connection. You'll also need to familiarize yourself with online learning tools like LingroHub and Blackboard. Both are critical for accessing assignments, course materials, and grade updates. Make note of student computer lab availability in the event you should need it.

Assignments:

All assignments, unless otherwise stated, are due by the deadline listed on LingroHub. Assignments will include readings, textbook exercises (both oral and written), LingroHub activities, and other tasks designed to reinforce your language acquisition.

- **Online Assignments:** Due by 11:59 PM CST on the assigned dates. You will have 1-3 due dates each week, depending on the course schedule and materials being studied. These will include:
 - LingroHub assignments (SAM activities, TXT exercises, etc.)
 - Watching and analyzing videos in Spanish
 - o Listening activities
 - o Compositions and speaking recordings

Make sure you complete your assignments carefully, as they form the foundation for our in-class activities. On average, expect to spend 3-5 hours per week outside of class on preparation, vocabulary review, and exercises.

Late Work:

Assignments will not be accepted late or incomplete. Translation websites for written assignments in Spanish are not allowed. This is considered a violation of academic integrity.

Attendance/Content Completion:

Regular engagement with the course materials and timely completion of online assignments is mandatory. Missing assignments or failing to participate will negatively impact your progress.

• **Content Completion:** You must always remain above 80% of assigned content completion. This demonstrates your participation in the content/class. If you drop below 80% of assigned content completion, you will be warned once with any further occurrences resulting in you being dropped from the course.

LingroHub Assignments:

Assignments in LingroHub include various activities designed to reinforce the course content. These activities are aligned with your textbook and grammar tutorials. Each assignment type is explained below:

1. SAM Activities:

These are your primary exercises, and you will be able to complete them up to three times. Your highest score will be recorded, so use your mistakes as learning opportunities.

2. TXT Activities:

These are reading-intensive exercises that are directly tied to your textbook. These also can be completed up to three times to improve your understanding.

3. Extra Practice:

These are essential activities toward the end of each chapter and are graded the same as other assignments, so treat them with the same importance. They focus on core grammar skills for each chapter.

4. Practice Tests:

Practice tests may be assigned before major exams. These can be completed up to three times for your best score.

5. Grammar and Vocabulary Tutorials:

These are available within the chapter lessons and can always be accessed, even if they are not explicitly assigned. I will assign some, but feel free to revisit them as needed.

Evaluation & Grading:

- LingroHub Assignments: 60%
- Exams (Including any Reader Exams): 40%

Note: A grade of 'C' or higher is required to progress to the next level of Spanish (SPAN 1412). Letter grades are calculated as follows:

A—90-100 **B**—80-89 **C**—70-79 **D**—60-69 **F**—0-59

Missed Assignments:

There are no make-up assignments, quizzes, or exams. If an unexpected event, such as illness or a family emergency, affects your ability to complete assignments on time, please contact me as soon as possible. While I am willing to work with you on a case-by-case basis, such occurrences should be rare.

Chapter Exams:

Online exams will be administered through LingroHub on designated test days at the end of the respective chapters. They will be timed, and all questions must be answered in one sitting. You will have one attempt to complete each exam, and they will cover vocabulary, grammar, reading, and listening skills.

Oral Final Evaluation:

A comprehensive oral final evaluation is required for all students. Specific details regarding the date and format will be provided later in the course.

Special Notice:

If you decide to stop attending class, it is your responsibility to follow the proper procedures and drop the course. The final day to withdraw is Thursday, April 24th. If you fail to maintain an 80% completion rate in LingroHub after receiving a warning, you may be dropped from the course.

Academic Integrity:

Cheating and plagiarism, including the use of unauthorized AI tools or translation websites, are serious offenses. This course relies on your personal engagement with the language, and any form of dishonesty will not be tolerated. Refer to the SPC General Catalog and Student Guide for more details.
