Course Description: SPAN 1411 (4:3:3). This course is specifically designed for beginning Spanish students. The course includes a study of basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level. Semester Hours: 4; Lecture Hours: 3; Lab Hours: 3. Pre-requisite: none. Students with two or more years of high school Spanish or significant Spanish-speaking background will be enrolled in SPAN 1412.

Additional Information:

This course is designed to enhance your skills in Spanish through interaction, communication, and an understanding of Hispanic culture. It focuses on all aspects of the language—speaking, listening, reading, and writing and aims to deepen your cultural knowledge. There will be a strong emphasis on both reading and speaking, requiring significant preparation and active oral practice in class. You'll participate in various activities that involve sharing real-life information about yourself.

Your listening comprehension will continue to improve as you engage with the language through in-class conversations, as well as listening to recordings and completing comprehension exercises in Lingrohub and other online or in-class materials. I encourage you to immerse yourself in Spanish outside of class by watching Spanish-language programs, listening to Spanish radio, reading materials that interest you in Spanish, and seeking opportunities to converse with Spanish speakers.

You'll also have plenty of opportunities to practice speaking Spanish in both group and class-wide settings. While fluency is key, understanding fundamental grammar rules is also crucial for building proficiency. We'll discuss these grammar principles in English to ensure clarity.

Learning these communication skills requires consistent practice and dedication. Language development happens gradually, and there's no shortcut for mastery. You'll have access to a variety of resources to support your success, and you'll be held to high expectations in all areas of the course.

Additionally, having an active SPC email account and online access is essential for this course. Be sure to familiarize yourself with campus computer lab locations and hours.

Assignments: Assignments are to be prepared before class. Each assignment will be due at the beginning of class unless otherwise stated. Assignments will include readings and textbook exercises (oral and written/typed), supplementary worksheets, the MySpanish Lab (MSL) assignments and any other activities designed to stimulate and reinforce foreign language acquisition. Please prepare your

assignments carefully and expect to participate in class discussion. On average you should study an amount of time equal to that spent in class. Assignments will not be accepted incomplete or late (after I've taken them up). This includes arriving late to class. Please note that in this class, utilizing translation websites for written assignments in Spanish will not be allowed and will infringe upon the guidelines of academic integrity.

Assignments: This course will cover chapters 1-4 of the Arriba textbook. In-class assignments are due at the beginning of class. In-class assignments will not be accepted incomplete or late (after I've taken them up). This includes arriving late to class. All online assignments are to be completed by 11:59pm CST on the assigned due dates. You will have 1-3 due dates per week depending on the course and materials to be studied. Assignments will include but are not limited to your online Arriba Lingrohub assignments, watching videos in Spanish, listening activities, compositions in Spanish, and speaking activities/recordings. Please prepare your assignments carefully.

On average you should study an amount of time equal to that spent in class. This will likely entail 3-5 hours weekly, including preparation, vocabulary review, exercises, etc. Assignments will not be accepted incomplete or late. Please note that in this class, utilizing translation websites for written assignments in Spanish will not be allowed and will infringe upon the guidelines of academic integrity.

Attendance: This class is a face to face class and your attendance is mandatory. You must arrive on time and stay for the entire duration of the class to be counted present. You will be allowed 4 absences for this course. You will be dropped from the course upon the **4th** absence.

Arriba--Lingrohub assignments (online) are structured as follows:

SAM activities- These Student Activity Manual exercises (SAM) will be the majority of your online assignments on the Lingrohub calendar. After studying the presentation materials and essential tutorials, you will complete the related assignments and will be able to check your answers for feedback/correction and then submit these exercises up to 3 times, your highest grade is recorded. It is important that you self-evaluate and learn from your mistakes in these exercises. These are not exams; they are homework so you should be utilizing your textbook and notes to complete them (be prepared before you start).

TXT activities- These activities are identical to the ones listed in your textbook on the pages indicated. These tend to be more reading intense so take your time and make the extra effort to look up what's being said. You may also work these up to 3X.

Extra Practice activities- These activities are usually assigned toward the end of the chapter. They are not optional practice as they weigh the same as other grades so don't be fooled by the title. These test your essential grammar for the chapter and are closely related to the assigned tutorials in the Lingrohub. You may also work these up to 3X.

Practice Test- Depending on the test format, these may be assigned prior to a given exam. These can be worked up to 3X and your highest grade will be taken. You should check the feedback bubble after your 1st attempt and look at your mistakes and possible hints.

Grammar and Vocabulary Tutorials—these are ALWAYS available in the presentación sections of the chapter lessons. I will purposely assign some on the calendar, but you can always access them from each grammar presentation section of the chapter.

Tests- These will be posted on designated test days/location. They will be timed, and all questions must be answered. You will have one attempt. They will cover all forms of grammar and vocabulary from the chapter. You will have Listening, Reading, and Writing sections in multiple formats (true/false, fill in the blank, multiple choice, word banks, and short sentence answers).

*A grade of 'C' or better is required in order to continue to the next level of Spanish at SPC. The next course is SPAN 1412

Assignments and Lingrohub (online): This class includes a 3-hour weekly lab obligation in addition to class meetings and discussions. This means that you must log in weekly and successfully complete the assigned activities and exercises in order to pass the course. You are to remain above 80% completion of all assigned exercises at any given time. Students not meeting this requirement will

receive one warning in writing. Failure to meet requirements will result in the student being dropped from the course (see Special Notice section below).

Missed assignments: There will be **no make-up work, quizzes, nor make-up exams**. In addition to the campus safety plan, I encourage you to let me know if you fall ill during the course of the semester, a family emergency, or find yourself with an approved school activity that impedes with pending MSL assignments (not past due). I will, at my discretion and within reason, work with you. I would expect these occurrences to be rare. Please do not ask for nor expect "extra credit" as your ability to work the vast majority of your assignments multiple times is very generous and designed to help you help yourself *throughout* the semester.

Chapter Exams: Chapter exams will consist of timed evaluations over the textbook chapter material/readings. Format will vary but will completed on the Lingrohub platform. You are not allowed to access any materials or 3rd party sources for completing exams unless instructed otherwise.

Oral Final Evaluation: Every student must take the comprehensive Oral Final Exam. Specific date and format to be determined.

Special Notice: If at any time you decide to quit attending class is your responsibility to follow the appropriate procedures and drop the course. I strongly encourage you to visit with your professor before dropping any course. The last day to drop the course is Thursday, April 24th. If you have not logged into the Lingrohub, maintained an 80% completion of all posted exercises after being warned, expect to be dropped from the course by the instructor.

Academic Integrity: Cheating and plagiarism constitute serious offenses and will not be tolerated. (Refer to the SPC General Catalog and Student Guide). For this class, the use of AI, online translators/websites for assignments, unless authorized, is considered cheating.

Tips for Successfully Completing Writing and Recording Tasks:
