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COURSE INFORMATION

 <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u> An analysis of the economy as a whole including measurement and determination of aggregate demand and aggregate supply, national income, inflation, and unemployment. Other topics include international trade, economic growth, business cycles, and fiscal policy and monetary policy.

- PREREQUISITE: None. However, it's preferred that students have taken or are currently enrolled in MATH 1324.
- CREDIT: Lecture 3; Lab 0
- <u>CORE CURRICULUM</u>: This course partially satisfies the Core Curriculum Requirement for Social and Behavioral Science Foundational Component Area (080).

• CORE CURRICULUM OBJECTIVES ADDRESSED:

Communications skills—to include effective written, oral and visual communication

Critical thinking skills—to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information

Empirical and quantitative competency skills—to manipulate and analyze numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions

Personal Responsibility—to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.

Social Responsibility—to include the demonstrated knowledge and competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

• COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Explain the role of scarcity, specialization, opportunity cost and cost/benefit analysis in economic decision-making.
- 2. Identify the determinants of supply and demand; demonstrate the impact of shifts in both market supply and demand curves on equilibrium price and output.
- 3. Define and measure national income and rates of unemployment and inflation.
- 4. Identify the phases of the business cycle and the problems caused by cyclical fluctuations in the market economy.
- 5. Define money and the money supply; describe the process of money creation by the banking system and the role of the central bank.
- 6. Construct the aggregate demand and aggregate supply model of the macro economy and use it to illustrate macroeconomic problems and potential monetary and fiscal policy solutions.
- 7. Explain the mechanics and institutions of international trade and their impact on the macro economy.
- 8. Define economic growth and identify sources of economic growth.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Homework Assignments: 20% The lowest homework grade will be dropped at the END of the semester.

Chapter Quizzes: 30% The lowest quiz grade will be dropped at the END of the semester.

- All quizzes will be comprised of information from the textbook, chapter homework assignments, and handouts posted in Blackboard.
- No makeup quizzes will be allowed. If a student is unable to complete a quiz during the scheduled time frame, arrangements must be made prior to the quiz opening for the week.

Exams: 40%

Unit Exams:
