HOW THIS HYBRID CLASS WORKS:

Everything on Blackboard should be used to be successful in class.

1. LECTURES will be Face-to-Face (F2F). ALL <u>lecture exams</u> will be F2F.

On Blackboard, you will find modules for each lecture exam which contain all the lecture materials you need.

The Lecture Exam Modules will contain these study materials for lecture:

- 1) Lecture Notes—MUST BE PRINTED AND BROUGHT TO LECTURE
- 2) Lecture Powerpoints

Lecture Exam Reviews provide additional practice and will help you with what type of exam questions will be asked. (Lecture reviews do not cover every type of possible question, but they do point to major concepts.)

<u>Start using lecture exam reviews as soon as we begin the lecture notes</u> and be sure to study reviews at least 3 times. You should memorize the review *along with* the lecture notes to get the most benefit from it (instead of looking at it the night before the test).

2. LABS will be studied completely ONLINE. ALL <u>lab exams (practicals)</u> will be ONLINE.

On Blackboard, you will find modules for each lab practical exam which contain all the lab materials you need.

* Lab Screencasts should be studied for each lab. They are video with audio. In these you will be taught the lab.

* Lab Powerpoints should also be studied for each lab. They have the same images as the Screencasts, except with no audio.

*Lab Reviews should be used to test yourself. They usually cover several labs.

Attendance Policy:

Please Note: CLASS ATTENDANCE DOES AFFECT YOUR FINAL AVERAGE IN CLASS.

Students are expected to attend EVERY class period. *Students are allowed <u>3</u> absences without penalty.* After the third absence, 15 points will be taken off the attendance grade for every additional absence. Unfortunately, the attendance grade can go below zero with excessive absences.

In order to be completely fair with everyone, there are certain reasons for missing class that will ALWAYS count as an absence. *Missing any exam will ALWAYS count as an absence*. *A missed exam will mean -15 from your attendance grade*. <u>See page 6 for more important information about missed exams</u>.

Missing any exam due to a diagnosis of Covid-19 <u>will not</u> count as an absence ONLY IF DeEtte Edens has verified a positive Covid-19 test for you.

ALSO: At the end of the semester there will be a "GRADE BOOST OPP" (opportunity) for those of you who have 3 or fewer absences. This will be an opportunity to significantly improve your grade. You will have to work hard for this grade boost, but it will be worth it! This can make a *huge* difference in your final average if you take advantage of it. *This chance to do the GRADE BOOST OPP will happen when we get to the Nervous System Lecture Exam (the last lecture exam of the semester).*

Please be aware that the following WILL <u>always</u> count as an absence:

- *Leaving class early for any reason
- *A Covenant interview or similar during class time

- *Missing a test of any kind

MISSED EXAM POLICY

A. PLEASE READ CAREFULLY!

ONLY 1 MISSED EXAM CAN BE MADE UP This means ONLY 1 missed lecture exam OR 1 missed lab exam (practical) can be made up. The second missed exam (of any type) will be a ZERO.

B. MISSED F2F LECTURE EXAMS:

- 1) Only ONE missed lecture exam can be made up. The second missed lecture exam will be a ZERO.
- 2) Missed lecture exams will be made up <u>on paper</u> at the end of the semester Monday, April 28 through Friday, May 2.

OR can be made up by taking a paper comprehensive final semester Monday, April 28 through Friday, May 2.

- * The comprehensive lecture final covers all lecture exam materials for the semester. This can ONLY replace ONE missed lecture exam (but cannot replace a missed lab practical). The second missed lecture exam will be a ZERO.
- 3) Taking a lecture exam late WILL count as an absence.
- 4) A missed lecture exam will mean -15 on your attendance grade.

C. MISSED ONLINE LAB PRACTICALS:

- 1) Only ONE missed lab practical can be made up UNLESS you have missed a lecture exam. In that case, a missed lab practical will be a ZERO.
- 2) Missed lab exams will be made up online at the end of the semester Monday, April 28 through Friday, May 2.
- 3) Taking a lab practical late WILL count as an absence.
- 4) A missed lab practical will mean -15 on your attendance grade.
- 5) Taking a lab exam LATE due to technical difficulties with HonorLock will not affect your attendance grade UNLESS <u>you are not making reasonable steps to correct the</u> <u>problem</u>, such as: 1) finding another computer to use or 2) coming to the Levelland or Reese campuses to take the exam.

USING HONORLOCK FOR ONLINE LAB EXAMS (PRACTICALS):

All lab practicals (exams) will be taken ONLINE (at home) using a program called Honorlock. Students will be required to use this webcam software that records video & audio. Some guides you should review are <u>Honorlock MSRs</u>, <u>Honorlock FAQs for Test Takers</u>, <u>Honorlock Knowledge Base</u>, and <u>How to Use Honorlock</u>.

A. You will need the following to use Honorlock:

- 1) A webcam (embedded or external)
- 2) A computer microphone
- 3) Chrome browser installed on your computer
- 4) Honorlock installed on your computer
- 5) Your Driver's License (or other I.D.) to show at the beginning of the exam

B. At the START of the online exam, you will be required to do a ROOM SCAN:

- The room scan means you will show your desk surface, room, and walls using a webcam. This can be done using the embedded webcam itself or a with a large <u>hand-held mirror</u> if the webcam is external.
- 2) You may be flagged for a room scan that is not done properly.
- 3) If you do not do the room scan properly, penalties on the test grade may be taken.

C. The ROOM SCAN must show the following:

- That the area you are taking the exam is clean- **no notes, class materials, phones, or other technology** is close by. Please flatten out any covers if you are sitting on a bed.
- The desk surface is clean with no notes, reviews, phones, etc. of any kind.
- The walls in the room do not contain notes.
- There are no other adults in the room.

<u>D.</u> *If you run into any problems during an exam:* Contact Honorlock support *through live chat within the exam itself. Honorlock support is available 24/7/365.*

Some guides you should review are <u>Honorlock MSRs</u>, <u>Honorlock FAQs for Test Takers</u>, <u>Honorlock</u> <u>Knowledge Base</u>, and <u>How to Use Honorlock</u>.

E. While Taking the Exam:

- 1) After showing the room scan, the webcam needs to be **able to see your head and arms** for the duration of the exam. Your **full face must be visible**.
- 2) Once the exam begins, you will not be able to leave the room.

COVID-19 Statements and Protocol:

- * Proof of a positive test is required.
- * A <u>home test</u> is sufficient, but students must submit a **photo** of the positive result. The **date** of test must be written on the test result and an **ID included in the photo**.
- * If <u>tested at a clinic, pharmacy</u>, etc., please submit a **copy of the doctor's note or email notification.**
- * All tests results MUST be emailed to <u>dedens@southplainscollege.edu</u>.
- * Students are required to complete a **3 day isolation period** (quarantine) starting the day after testing positive.
- * Students are clear to return to class after isolation if: 1) Symptoms have improved and 2) they have been without fever for 24 hours without use of fever-reducing medication.
- * Students must communicate with DeEtte Edens, BSN, RN prior to their return date if symptomatic at the end of the 5-day isolation.

Class Requirements While in Quarantine:

PLEASE BE AWARE that while you are in quarantine:

1) You are EXPECTED TO TAKE LECTURE EXAMS ON TIME, AT THE SCHEDULED EXAM DATES. I will provide you with lecture screencasts to allow you to study online while in isolation/quarantine. PLEASE ask me to send you the screencasts. *This will mean you'll take the exam ONLINE (at home) using HonorLock*. There will be very few exceptions made.

2) You are EXPECTED TO TAKE LAB EXAMS (practicals) ON TIME, AT THE SCHEDULED EXAM DATES. Since labs are studied completely online, you are expected to study and prepare for exams while in isolation/quarantine. This will mean you'll take the exam online (at home) using HonorLock just like you normally would. There will be very few exceptions made.

Dropping/Withdrawal from a Class:

If you stop coming to class and do not drop yourself from the class, you will receive an "F." Please do not assume your professor will drop you if you stop attending class. It is your responsibility to drop yourself from a course.

Artificial Intelligence Statement:

Purpose of Artificial Intelligence (AI) Applications:

Al applications such as ChatGPT, OpenAI, Bard, Grammarly, WordTune and others are advanced language models designed to aid and engage in meaningful conversations, as well as, generate and revise content. Al is intended to supplement learning, stimulate critical thinking, and enhance academic discourse. However, its use comes with certain responsibilities.

Academic Integrity:

Using AI to generate academic work, including essays, reports, or assignments, without proper attribution is a violation of SPC academic integrity policies. Plagiarism undermines the learning process and is strictly prohibited. Students must ensure that their work reflects their own ideas, research, synthesis, and analysis and appropriately cites all sources, including AI.

Collaboration and Consultation:

While AI can be a valuable resource, it is essential to strike a balance between seeking assistance and maintaining personal responsibility. Collaboration with peers, consulting instructors, and utilizing other approved learning resources should be prioritized. Overreliance on AI for solutions without actively engaging in the learning process is discouraged and can be grounds for academic integrity violations. Utilizing AI as a tool for brainstorming or research is allowed but the writing should be the student's own work and thoughts.

• Critical Thinking and Originality:

Al usage can provide suggestions and information, but it is essential to critically evaluate the responses and exercise independent thought. Relying solely on AI for answers deprives students of the opportunity to develop their analytical and problem-solving skills. In assignments where originality, creativity, and independent thinking are valued, AI would be detrimental to the student learning process. Critical thinking and originality emphasize the importance of independent thinking in all academic endeavors as part of the student's learning experience apart from outside influence and offers the student the opportunity to refine their unique, individual voice through academic discourse with other students and faculty.

• Ethical Use and Bias Awareness:

Al is trained on large amounts of data from the internet, which may include biased or inaccurate information. Be mindful of the potential for bias and critically evaluate the responses provided by Al. Therefore, when using Al, just like with using any other database, students must verify that the information is from reliable sources, question any potential biases, and ensure that the information and sources used in the paper are neutral, peer-reviewed sources.

Responsible Engagement:

Students should engage with AI in a respectful and responsible manner and avoid using offensive language, discriminatory remarks, or engaging in any form of harassment or inappropriate behavior. Students should also uphold the standards of respectful communication in addressing both AI and fellow classmates.

Compliance with South Plains College Policies:

Policies regarding the appropriate use of AI in South Plains College courses are set by instructional departments and individual instructors. Appropriate use of AI may range from strict prohibition to assignments they may require the use of AI.
